- Ensure my child gets a good night's sleep each night.
- Attend parent/teacher conferences, parent school, evening activities, and call the school as needed to monitor my child's progress.
- Check with my child daily for information sent home from school (classroom newsletter, homework log, behavior log, notes from the teacher, etc.), read it and respond, if necessary.

Student Responsibilities:

- Come to school each day ready to learn and do your best!
- Complete homework every day and ask for help if I don't understand something.
- Read every day (20-30 minutes) outside of school time.
- Give my parents all daily information sent home from school (classroom newsletter, homework log, behavior log, notes from the teacher, etc.), read it and respond, if necessary.
