THE ECLIPSE

Did You Know?

Arlington is in the eclipse's narrow path of totality. This means that we see a Total Eclipse of the moon covering the sun instead of a partial eclipse.

<u>Glasses</u>

You need to wear glasses to watch the Eclipse and can only take them off during totality! For the safety of everyone watching the Eclipse, Arlington School is providing <u>TWO</u> pairs of Eclipse glasses for each student. Glasses will be sent home by April 5.







Another Way To Watch

Make sure your back is facing the sun and hold the colander about 20" above the ground. As the sun shines through the holes, you will see a projection of multiple images of the sun that correspond to the current eclipse phase.



When is this happening? •((()))•

The Eclipse's partial will begin at 2:40 PM. At 3:10PM the total eclipse will begin and the sky will darken as if it were dawn or dusk. The totality will last nearly 4 minutes, until 3:14 PM. The partial eclipse will be over at 4:26 PM.



<u>What To Look For</u>

There are many parts of the Total Eclipse, but what you'll really want to look at is the Diamond Ring Effect that the Eclipse creates. When you look at the Sun's corona, you are actually seeing the outer layer of the Sun! Bailey's beads are created from the moon not being a perfect circle.

Did You Know?

- There will be no school on Monday, April 8.
- You need a specialized eclipse filter between your smartphone camera and the sun to safely capture the eclipse.
- You can expect the temperature to drop about 10 degrees Fahrenheit during the total eclipse.
- This is a once-and-a-lifetime event; the next total solar eclipse that will cross Ohio will be in the year 2099.
